The cabin turned into a smoke house. My only hope to avoid frost bite was to keep moving. I walked in circles all night -cold but generating enough body heat to manage until daylight . When first light arrived I could see we were not too far from Sans Souci

I knew there was no one home but I also knew there was a snow machine available. I found it. In 15 min we were at the cottage with a fire going. A few minutes later, both the dog and I were curled up together beneath a heating blanket sound asleep.
